A number of the Jesuit Missions are noted as churches along the coastline of the Great Lakes. Fort Miamis is also noted. Great Lakes delineation is considered the most accurate rendering of the Lakes published in the 18th Century and was the foundation for maps of the region for a number of years thereafter. Bellin's later fictitious islands in Lake Superior do not appear. Included are a number of illustrations within the body of the map, showing indigenous peoples and activities.
