Description:

Fine wall map of the the United States, illustrating the transitional western Territorial and State borders, including the proposed Territory of Colona, published by S A Mitchell in 1860.

First published in 1856, Mitchell's remarkable wall map is perhaps the single most recognizable walll map of the United States of the period.

Embellished with inset maps of the Sandwich Islands and 2 maps of the World, and including decorative vignettes and extensive tables, the map was one of the most commercially successful maps of its time, regularly amended to upate the changing territorial and state borders of the West.

The present map is noteworthy for the inclusion of several remarkable place names, including Colona (the briefly proposed name for Colorado Territory) and Shoshone (the proposed name for Idaho). The map also includes Arizona below New Mexico Territory (the so-called Baylor Line), massive Washington Territory and Nebraska Territory, and a long thin Kansas Territory, which would be changed to form Colorado the following year. A massive Utah Territory is also shown, although the newly created Nevada Territory (not created until March 2, 1861) does not yet have a separate boundary with Utah. A number of counties traverse across the entire region.



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Mitchell was apparently keenly aware of the proposed territorial additions and names, as many of the names above were either not yet adopted or never adopted.

While Mitchell's map is not rare, the 1860 edition seldom appears on the market and rarely in such fine condition.

Detailed Condition:

Minor soiling, but generally an exceptional example.
