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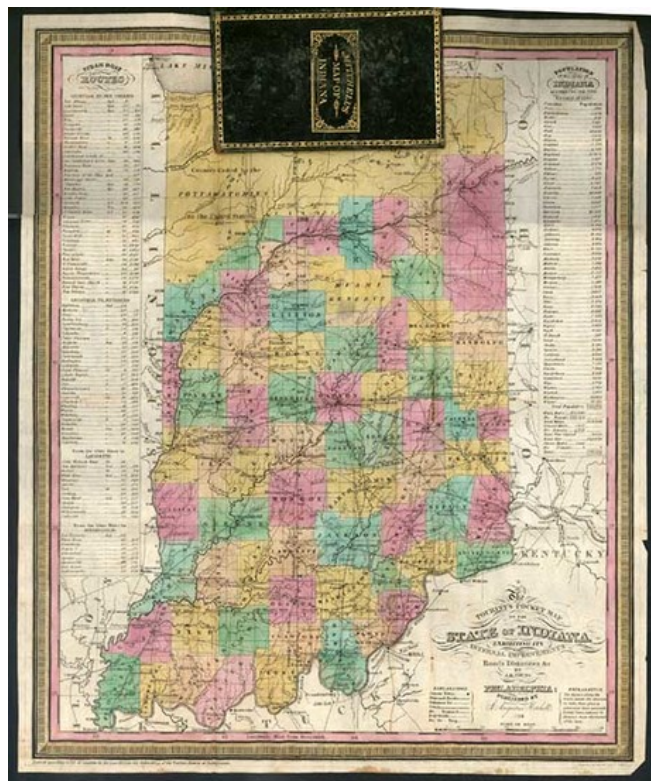

**Description:**

Nice example of Mitchell's pocket map of Indiana. The map is colored by counties and shows, roads, railroads, towns, and distances. Two tables include the population of Indiana's Counties in 1830 and the Steamboat routes to Louisville, New Orleans, interesting historical details, including the Harris Line surveyed in 1817, and Fulton's Line surveyed in Pittsburg, Lafayette and Indianapolis. A good example, with a few very short fold splits. Folding into green 16mo cloth covers, with gilt title. Nice covers. Pastedown explanation of the public lands and surveys on the inner front board and Mitchell's own pastedown (5th Street Address) on the rear board under the map. A number of oversized primitive counties and Indian regions still shown, including the Country ceded by the Pottawatomies to the U.S. in 1832 and the Miami Reserve. Shows towns, counties, roads, early railroads, canals, Indian Villages, etc. Apparently the 2nd edition, as the map bears a recording date of 1833.
