#### Description:

An attractive early view of Fort Nassau.

This fine early view depicts the scene of a battle off the coast of Pernambuco on the east coast of Brazil, during the Dutch & Portuguese struggle to retain ownership of the area. Fort Nassau (Arx Nassovii) shown in this scene, along with two other Forts (not shown) Fort Prince William & Fort Frederik Hendrik, formed part of the defense of the coast. Fort Nassau was named after Count Mauritius de Nassau, a German serving the Dutch King who was appointed Governor of the Territory.

This view appeared in John Ogilby's seminal atlas *America: Being the Latest, and Most Accurate Description of the New World*, published in London in 1671. Ogilby's work is an English translation of Arnoldus Montanus' *Die Nieuwe en onbekende Weereld...*, published in Amsterdam, although greatly expanded in some instances and with new maps and views.
