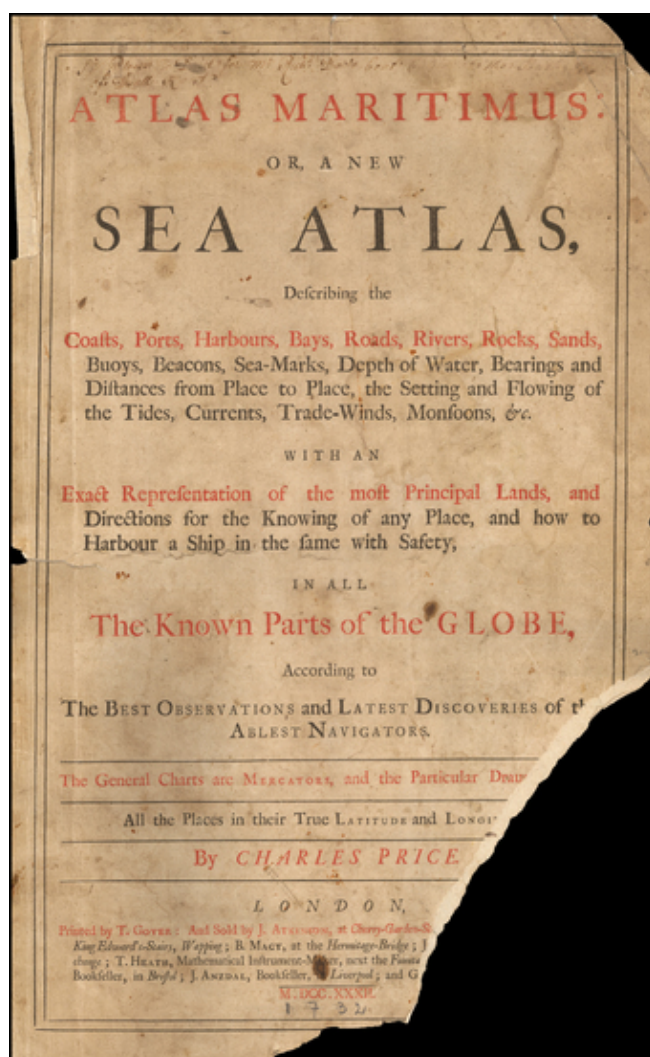

Title Page for a Previously Unknown 18th Century English Sea Atlas



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One of two surviving examples of Charles Price's unfinished *Atlas Maritimus*, published in London in 1732.

As noted by Tony Campbell in his description of the British Library's acquisition of a 21 chart collection of maps without title page in the early 1980s, by 1730, Charles Price had announced his intention to publish "a Compleat Sea Atlas" to remedy 'the Great want of a good sett of Sea Charts now extant in Great Britain (excepting for our own Coasts).' It was believed that the project was not completed, as Price was believed to have sold off his charts by 1731 and ended 1731 in debtor's prison. However, the title page of this map shows that the project was in fact completed to the point of selling a collection of maps with the *Atlas Maritimus* title page, although neither of the two surviving examples included an index page.

The information noted by Tony Campbell above was drawn from an advertisement on one of the maps. This is the only note we can locate regarding Price's Sea Atlas, with the exception of an entry written in 1780 by William Gough in his *British Topography. Or, An Historical Account of what Has Been Done for Illustrating The Topographical Antiquities of Great Britain and Ireland* (1780) at page 112, wherein Gough notes:

*Charles Price seems to have engraved a set of English charts, 1726—30. A correct chart of the sea-coast from Arundel in Sussex, to St. Alban's in Dorsetshire. I have two, one dedicated to lord Masham, 1729; another to Thomas Jones, esq; one of the Chanel, and of Scilly islands. **He advertised proposals for engraving a compleat sea Atlas for the whole world, dedicated to capt. G. Rogers j to be sold at his shop in Westminster-hall.***

The only other surviving example of the atlas is held by the Bancroft Library, which bears the bookplate of William Mountaine, a mathematician and teacher of navigation whose works were published in the 1740s and 1750s by Mount & Page. The full title, as catalogued by the Bancroft Library, is:

Atlas maritimus, or, A new sea atlas, describing the coasts, ports, harbours, bays, roads, rivers, rocks, sands, buoys, beacons, sea-marks, depth of water, bearings and distances from place to place, the setting and flowing of the tides, currents, trade-winds, monsoons, &c. : with an exact representation of the most principal lands, and directions for the knowing of any



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place, and how to harbour a ship in the same with safety, in all the known parts of the globe, according to the best observations and latest discoveries of the ablest navigators : the general charts are Mercators, and the particular draughts plain : all the places in their true latitude and longitude.

Rarity

The Atlas is known in 1 institutional example, held by the Bancroft Library ,The Bancroft example bears the bookplate of William Mountaine, F.R.S. (1700-1779). Mountaine was a teacher of mathematics and navigation, who among other important publications revised James Atkinson's *Epitome of the Art of Navigation* (Atkinson name appears on a number of the charts in the atlas). A number of his works were published by Mount & Page. The Bancroft example was given to the Burnt-Yates School in 1775 and thereafter acquired by UC Berkeley in 1898 from a bookseller in Leeds who acquired the Burnt-Yates Library.

The Bancroft copy would appear to be later example of the atlas, including 30 charts, only 1 of which is in old color. The Bancroft example includes later states of 2 of the maps and earlier state of 1 of the maps and lacks one of the maps in this example. Of the 6 maps in the Bancroft example which are not in this example, all would appear to later engravings, done between 1730 and 1732. The impressions on the Bancroft copy are much weaker, suggesting that they were engraved quite awhile after this example.

Detailed Condition:
