

### The Clise Investment Company

James W. Clise, was president of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, and one of the most active and successful business men of Seattle.

Born in Lancaster, Wisconsin in 1855, he moved to Stockton, California in 1875, where he was engaged in mercantile business until 1879. He then moved to Denver, Colorado, where he was in the lumber business until 1889.

In 1889, he came to Seattle and organized the Clise Investment Company, of which he has since been president and general manager. Besides handling real estate and other investments, Mr. Clise served as agent for a number of prominent eastern capitalists in their investments in Seattle.

Mr. Clise is also manager of the Globe Navigation Company, which operated purchased steamships and

Clise's largest early sale was a land sale in Pioneer Square to Lyman C. Smith, who built the Smith Tower on that land.
