

Description:

The Father of Anti-Gravity Publishes A Pictorial Map of Washington DC

Impressive pictorial map of the Central portion of the City of Washington DC, published (in English, Spanish, German and French) by Emil Ludwig Scharf.

As noted in the biography below, Professor Scharf was, to put it mildly, quack scientist and minor conartist, who in the late 19th and early 20th Century seems to have been a linguist and language to tutor, working briefly for the Catholic University of America.

The defining moments of his infamy seem to have been his discovery of the formula for anti-gravity (*Washington Times*, April 3, 1904) and an attempt to obtain to solicit money for delivering catholic votes in a Kentucky Congressional race.
