
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The Road from Nottingham to Grimsby in the Count of Lincolne

Description:

Fine original antique road map of the region between Nottingham and Grimsby, in northeastern England. This map was published as part of John Ogilby's traveler's guide, a detailed treatment of the roads of England and Wales.

This map is particularly interesting for its non-traditional representation used. Embodying a onedimensional map, in which all detail is limited to the region alongside this road, the map would have been of immense use to the 18th-century traveler.

The map starts in Nottingham, before passing through Stoke and Newark. At mile 21, the traveler crosses into Lincolnshire. After several rural miles, Lincoln appears at the confluence of the River Wytham and Fosse Dyke. Hamilton Hill appears appears in the distance, before the voyager "Enter the Woulds." The dangerous Lincolnshire Wolds have some arable land, and finally, the flats are reached before Grimsby and the sea.

Detailed Condition:
